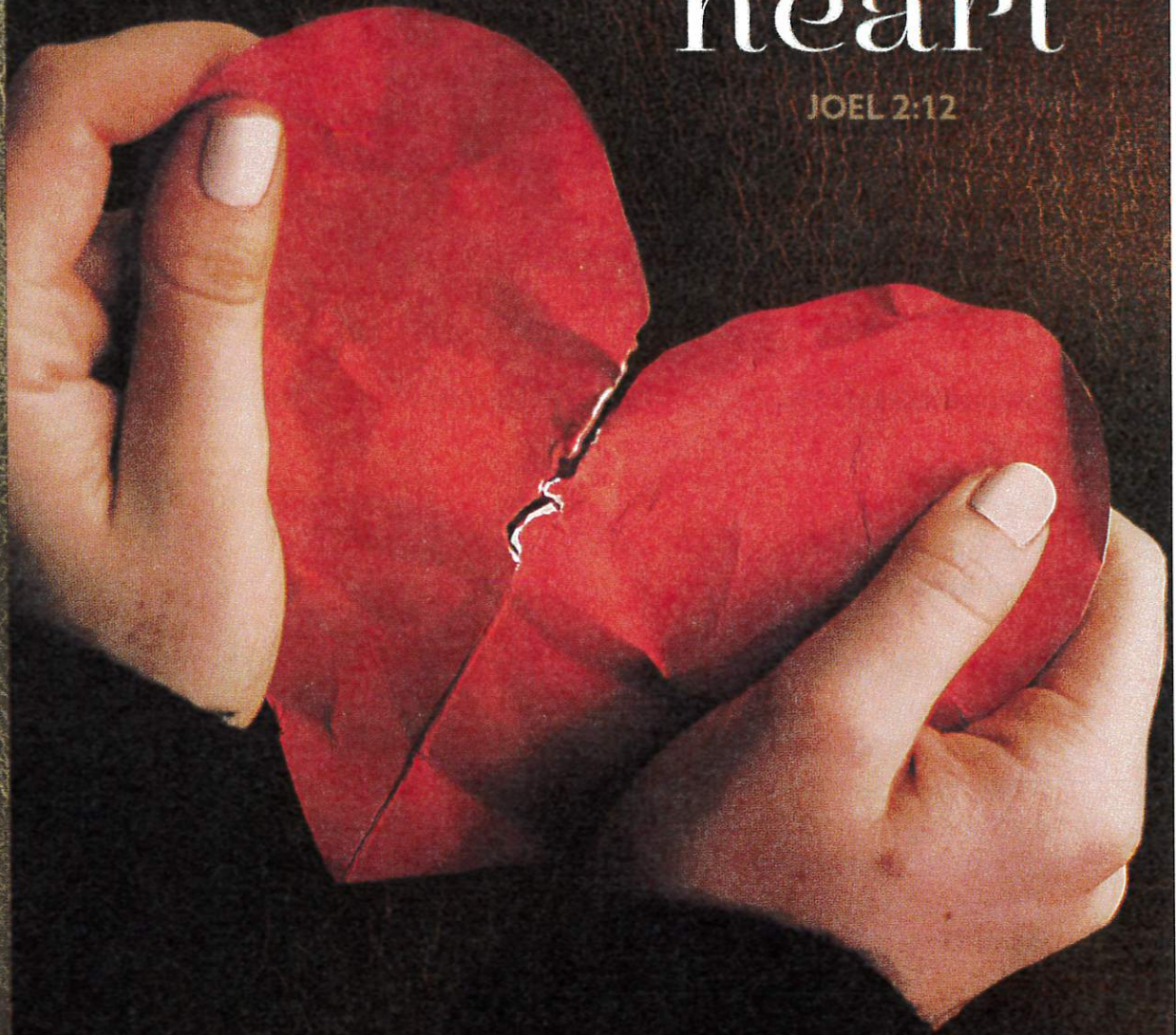

On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

FIRST READING

Joel 2:1-2; 12-17

A reading from Joel:

¹Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near—²a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come.

¹²Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; ¹³rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. ¹⁴Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD, your God?

¹⁵Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; ¹⁶gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy.

¹⁷Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?'"

A reading from Second Corinthians:

Chapter 5

^{20b}We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Chapter 6

As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you,
and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! ³We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, ⁴but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, ⁵beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; ⁶by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, ⁷truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; ⁸in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see — we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

¹⁶And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, ¹⁸so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

¹⁹Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

INVITATION TO LENT

CONFESSION OF SIN WITH IMPOSITION OF ASHES

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

Most holy and merciful God,

we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven,

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us, we confess to you.
Have mercy on us, O God.

Our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, we confess to you.
Have mercy on us, O God.

Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you.
Have mercy on us, O God.

Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.
Have mercy on us, O God.

Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.
Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth. May these ashes be a sign of our mortality and penitence, reminding us that only by the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ are we given eternal life; through the same Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.
Amen.

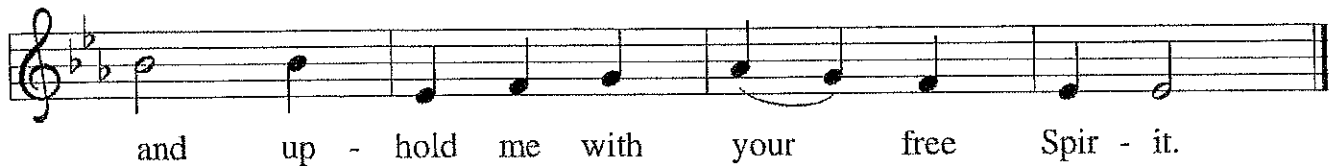

THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE ELEMENTS

Believing in the real presence of Christ, we invite all present to participate in the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Midweek Lenten Worship

Lent can be a somber season of the church year. It begins with an ashen sign of mortality and sin. Bright colors turn to deep purples, alleluias fall silent, and we ponder what to give up this year. Easter, on the other hand, is obviously joyful. Bells ring, alleluias echo, white and gold shine brightly, and every single candle is lit. Jesus is risen, and so are the daffodils, hyacinths, and lilacs. Joy clearly belongs to Easter.

During the season of Lent, each Wednesday, during our Lenten Evening Prayer Service, we will use Holden Evening Prayer and will experience a five-part Lenten drama series, "Conversations at the Pearly Gates." We will listen in on thought-provoking and sometimes humorous discussions regarding Heaven and Hell (known as "The Other Place") amongst several characters who have just arrived at the Pearly Gates. The theme for each week will be:

Ash Wednesday: Imposition of Ashes

Week 1: "God's Grace in Place"

Week 2: "Waiting in the Last Line"

Week 3: "Door #1, Door #2, or...?"

Week 4: "I'm Not a Physicist, But I Know What Matters"

Week 5: "The Pearly Gates: Film at Eleven"

In addition to our weekly Lenten worship services, we have weekly Lent devotion and study guides available on the Welcome Center at the Church.

We hope that you will join us on this Lenten journey as we seek that God-given joy that is richer and more nuanced than sheer happiness.

A Celebration of Mortality

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” These words will be spoken in congregations and communities around the world today as Christians gather to remember our collective mortality with a smudge of ashes on our foreheads. Facing the reality of death can feel grim, and to go as far as to celebrate our mortality can feel countercultural in every way. Yet, perhaps it is in remembering our mortality, our frailty, and our limits that we find true freedom.

On Ash Wednesday, we are set free from our striving to be God. We are set free from the expectation that we are somehow superhuman. We can lay down the false hope that achievement, fame, wealth, popularity, or being “good enough” can save us from our inevitable end. We are freed from our endless attempts to convince ourselves or others that we are right or perfect or holy or that we have it all together. Instead, we get to exhale as we remember that we are nothing but human. We are creatures of the dust, and despite our striving, our convincing, our appearance-making, despite every attempt at maximizing our time or our money or climbing whatever ladder we are trying to climb . . . we are dust, and to dust we shall return.

Ash Wednesday invites us to take our rightful place with the rest of creation. After all, God is God, and we are not. And yet, God sees our dusty human selves and calls us “good” (Genesis 1:27, 31). Christ enters into our very human, very mortal lives and makes us holy, giving us the gift of abundant and eternal life. We have already been made new. We have already been declared good. We have all we need, and now we are freed to simply live.

But first, we remember the dust. And we remember the One who formed us from the dust and who will meet us when we return to dust at the end.
