Grace-Gifted, Faith-Lifted Called to Share, Seek, and Serve Christ



Dear Friends in Christ,

I want to begin by thanking all of you who participated in the Listening Posts with the

Congregation Council in May. Over four weekends, we had the opportunity to sit together around the tables in the Fellowship Hall to enjoy cookies, coffee and lemonade. We were also able have conversations about our fears, struggles, hopes and dreams for our congregation. There were many great ideas that came out of those conversations, which Mike Garner speaks about more in his article on page 5. I hope and pray that you will take Mike up on his invitation to consider where your passions may lie along with others and where you might be willing to take a lead to bring some of these ideas to life for our congregation and community.

Among the conversation at these Listening Posts was also some helpful feedback on changes that have been made in our church operations that have not been as clearly communicated as we had hoped. Of primary concern was a feeling of not being welcome in the church at all times since the doors are now locked during the week. First, I want to assure you that you are *always* welcome at Faith Lutheran Church. This change in practice has nothing to do with wanting to keep the members of this congregation or the community around us out of our building. What this change in practice was meant to address was concerns by staff and members of our leadership surrounding the safety and security of those within the building, particularly at the times when few people are there. Let me share some of the history behind this change.

Even before the pandemic began, the Property Team, in particular, along with the Congregation Council, has been concerned about safety and security concerns surrounding our building and the people within it. Unfortunately, while we exist in a community that is safe by all reasonable standards, we are also aware that not everyone intends good in their actions, and in recent years, places of worship have been particular targets of evil. Over the last four years, members of the Property Team have met with various church safety consultants to look at where our vulnerabilities lie and consider suggestions as to ways in which we can provide the safest and most peaceful environment for our staff and congregation.

In the fall of 2021, the Property Team put together a new safety policy which addresses the ways in which we, as a congregation will respond to

all kinds of possible disaster, including those that we hope we will never have to face. As one of the guiding scriptures for this policy, we are reminded of the words of Jesus spoken to the disciples as Jesus sent them out to share the good news: "See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves" (Matthew 10:16). With this in mind, our safety policy resolves to use experience, training, and common sense to enact wise decisions while maintaining a peaceful atmosphere free of fear and full of trust in God.

Among the concerns that were addressed in the policy was a concern over the safety of the staff and others who use the building during the week when fewer people are there. Since the time that I arrived at Faith in 2016, the doors have been locked whenever the building is empty, but the doors were unlocked the majority of the time when someone was in the building, particularly during the day. However, the way in which our office area is configured, there is no way of knowing who is coming into the building until after that person is already in our offices. While we know that most people who enter our building do so with love and respect, we are also aware that there is the possibility of malice. Therefore, it was decided that the best way to be wise as serpents and innocent as doves was to provide a way for the staff to see who is entering the building and have the opportunity to ask for their purpose for those whom we do not recognize.

Therefore, it was determined that a doorbell system, along with a remote door opener, would be installed. This would allow for the doors to be locked, for the staff to ask the purpose of those whom we did not recognize, and for those in the office to easily open the doors for those who desired to enter. At times when a larger group is gathered in the church, for worship, for Confirmation and Youth group, for fellowship activities and at other times, the doors of the church are unlocked so that all may enter.

What I want to make clear, however, is that you are *always* welcome in the church. We know that some of you like to come and pray in the sanctuary during the week. Others enjoy perusing the library now and then. Still others have work that needs to get done during the week. Most of all, Beth Ann, Pastor Heather and I love having people come and visit and share what is going on in their lives. This is still, and perhaps especially true, after the last couple of years when we have been less able to be together, so please come and use the church whenever you wish.

The doorbell to the left of the doors is there so that you can let us know you are at the door. We will open the door for you and warmly welcome you inside. You are free to share your reason for being there with us, or if you simply want to go and pray or peruse the library or get some work done without interruption, you are welcome to do so. Generally, the office hours are Tuesday through Thursday from 8:00 am to 1:00 pm, with someone usually in the building until at least 3:00 pm. If there is a time when you need access to the building when no one is there, please contact me, and I will be happy to come over and unlock the doors for you. If I am not available, I am happy to contact someone else with a key to come and unlock it for you. My phone number is on the sign on the door for those times when you do not have it with you. Also, if you need regular access to the church for any reason, and having a key would be helpful for you, please contact me or a member of the Council, and we will be happy to talk with you about that possibility.

God has provided us with a beautiful space to gather for worship, for fellowship, for education, for use by community organization, and more, and we love seeing the church alive and filled with all the people whom God so loves, including all of you. So please, come. Join us in worship. Join us in fellowship. Come and use the church for community meetings and family gatherings. Come by and check in just to say hi. Come to find that place of peace in the midst of the chaos of the world around us. God is here. We are here. We rejoice when you are here as well.

After you look them over, let a council member or pastor know the ways in which you would like to join in. The council and ministry teams will be acting immediately on some of the ideas, and others require a bit more in in the way of volunteers and actions from you, the congregation. A few of the ideas looking for people with passion for them include: a women's at home book study group; a parents of teenagers group; a game night for all ages to play together (perhaps Bunco?); a movie group going to the DeWitt Theater; and a community or congregation day of service. Let a council member or the office know if you want to be part of making any of these ideas come to life.

Matt Peck and the whole council would also like to thank the Online Streaming Team who have been helpful in getting services online. Thanks to their efforts, so many people can participate in worship when they are unable to attend in person. Thank you all. Also, please take a look at the usher's stand in the gathering space and thank Nadine Schwarz for her effort in refinishing this much used item. It looks great Nadine.

The Congregation Council meeting was held on May 19th. The results of the Listening Posts thus far were discussed, and a few were set into action. Service in the World reported that four youth helped serve 51 Churches United meals at Zion Lutheran Church in Davenport, and another 29 meals were dropped off at Humility Homes and Services. The Service in the World Team, is always looking for people willing to help prepare and serve the meals. We are currently serving sack lunches that are handed to the clients at the door of the church, but we are hopeful that we will begin being able to serve full meals indoors soon. The council also approved submitting the cost of replacing the basement windows on the south side of the building to the Memorial Committee for funding as the windows need replacing.

I recently had the privilege of attending the Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly in Coralville. This was a terrific twoday experience, sharing

the love of God and fellowship with other Lutherans from across the state. I would encourage all of you to consider attending in the future.

Our own Pastor Carrie presented on the Growing Young curriculum and building a Jesus-centered community, particularly with our youth. One of the biggest takeaways for me when she presented the six Core Commitments of Growing Young Congregations was warm relationships. Specifically, instead of focusing on cool worship or programs, aim for warm peer and intergenerational friendships. Of course, this makes sense, right? I grew up at Faith Lutheran, literally! I attended kindergarten in the basement and attended my entire life with generations of family. I was blessed to learn about relationships in this beautiful church surrounded by a loving community. Is this not what we all crave? Yes! So, following her presentation Pastor Heather and I discussed the power of relationships, and curiously the fear and expectations as well.

So how do we do build warm relationships? Guess what...no one has the magic answer to what works and how to communicate. Each of us are as unique as snowflakes; therefore, the power in connecting is being open, vulnerable, and compassionate – to others and ourselves. Here are a few things that I have learned:

- ·Find common ground it is there, I promise, maybe in the kind of cookie you both like or shoes you are wearing.
- ·Just show up sounds simply right, but just being around others sometimes is what is needed to feel as though you belong.
- ·Engage in conversation make the first move and say hello. Then listen, really listen. It is awful when someone pretends to listen, but they are really just waiting to 'one up' your story. Listen, breathe, and paraphrase back what you heard.
- ·Assume good intent we do not always know exactly what to say, so practice grace and stay away from assumptions. They create a vicious cycle of miscommunication.
- ·Show Respect to yourself and others when you might not have enough energy to engage. Do not assume others are not interested.

- Maybe they are just worn out or protecting themselves from emotion overload.
- ·Eye contact put the phone away, do not be looking over their shoulder for something better to draw your attention, relax, and do not make them feel rushed.

Maybe these things came to mind as I question whether I am exercising all these consistently. It also might be because often we can feel let down by others and then worry that we will let others down. That fear of engaging holds us back. However, I believe (and Carl Rogers' theory proves it, if anyone is interested let me know) that genuine, authentic, and sincere interactions are powerful and build trusting relationships.

So, a challenge for all of us...how will you intentionally create and foster relationships in your life and our church?


Christ is Risen! Alleluia! It has been a wonderful Easter season full of celebrations and gatherings of people.
